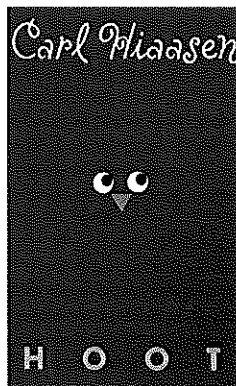
Fifth Grade

- Pick one of the following activities to complete about the book:
 - Make a poster depicting how the main character had courage.
 - Find a quote about courage and design a poster about it.
 - Write a poem about courage.
 - Write a short story about how you have used courage in your life.
 - Write a song about courage.
 - Watch a movie (not the book movie) and compare how courage is depicted in each. Use a Venn Diagram (attached) for your comparison.
- The second reading assignment is to have your child read one book from the attached **Battle of the Books List**.
- Fill out the attached form with the title of the book read, have your child draw a picture and write a sentence of his/her favorite part of the book.

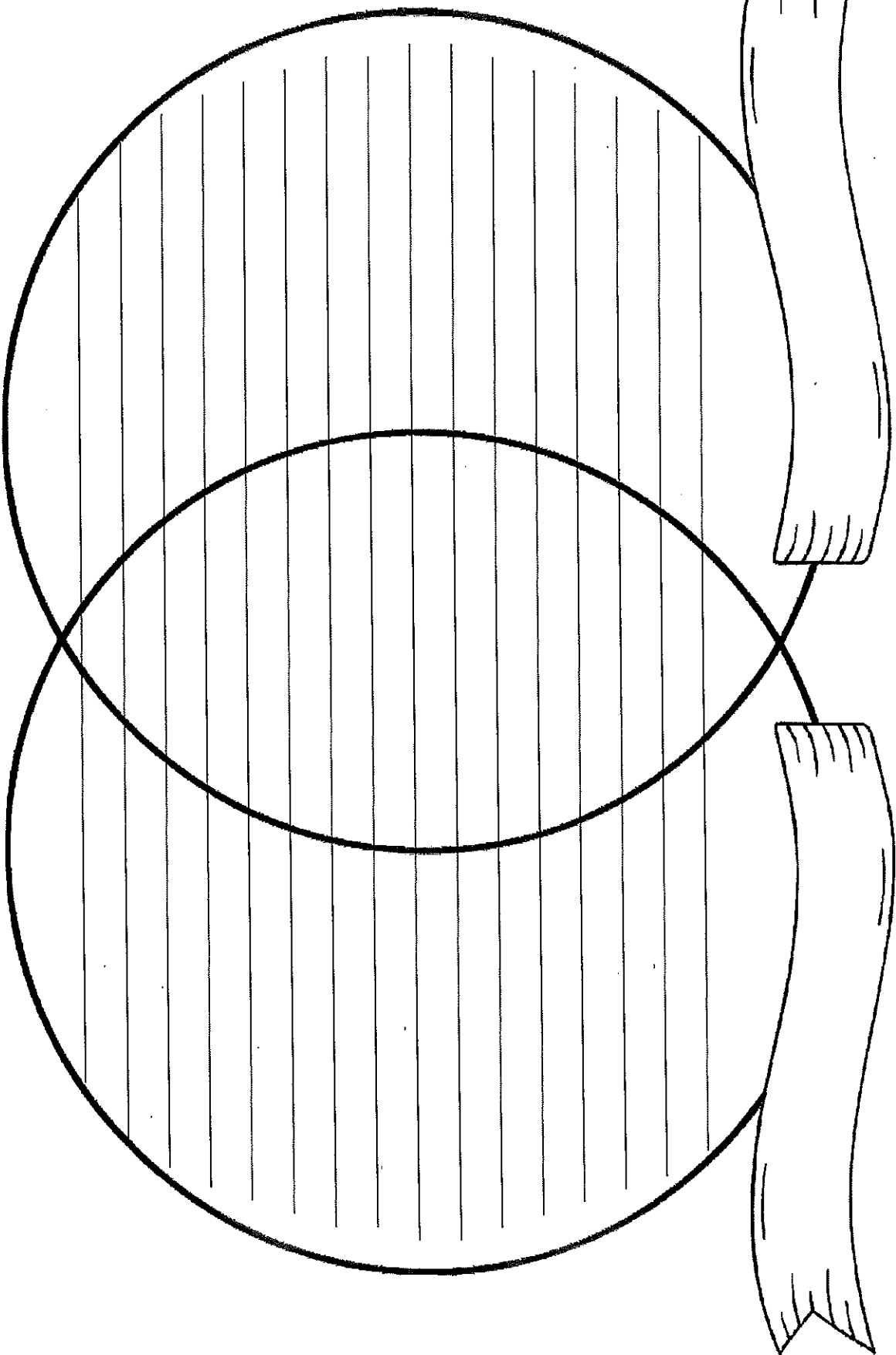

VENN DIAGRAM

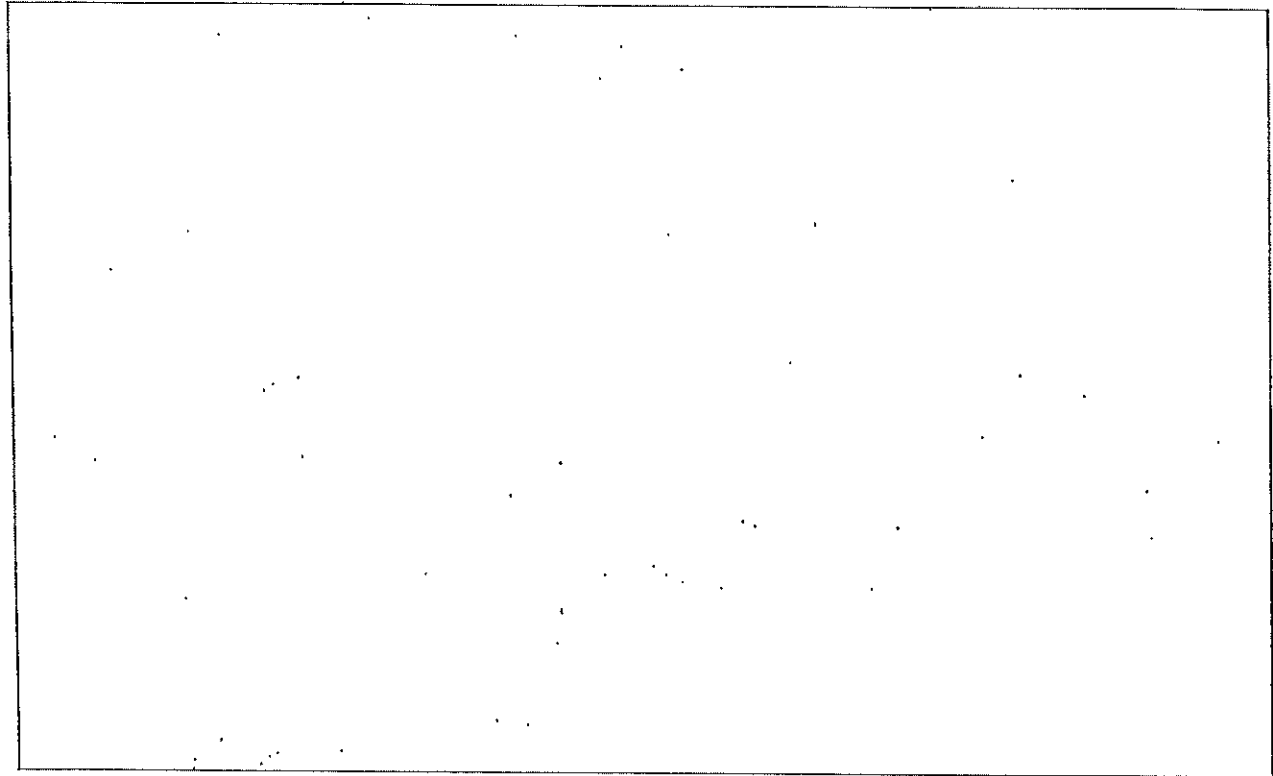

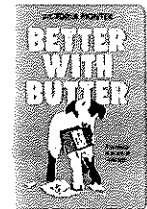
The Area 51 Files by Julie Buxbaum

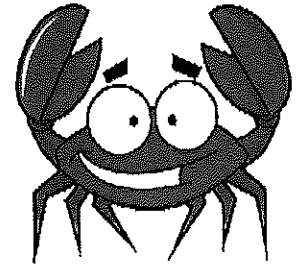
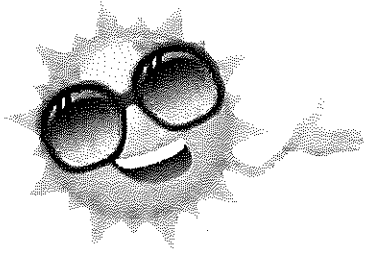
Stuck by Jennifer Swender

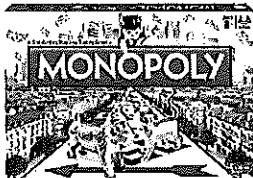
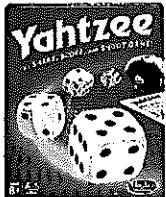
Below are the math recommendations we are suggesting for 4th & 5th Graders to be prepared for next year.



Students should earn a green dot in Reflex Math three times each week. Without practice, Math skills decline.



www.khanacademy.com has great videos to reteach concepts. Please remember that Brandon Academy students have an advanced math curriculum. If searching a grade level to review, incoming 4th graders should choose 4th grade math to review and incoming 5th grade should choose 5th grade math to review.



Play math games. Games like Yahtzee, Racko, Blokus, Set, and Monopoly all rely on skills necessary for math, such as counting, categorizing, and building.
