- Include at least 3 drawings, symbols or images that represent aspects of the story.

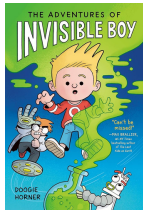

- Be sure to write your name!

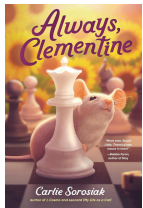

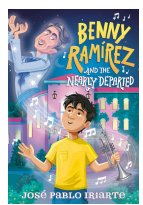
The Wildes by Roland Smith

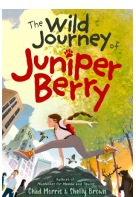
Peril at Price Manor by Laura Parulum



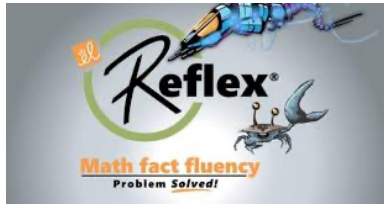

Here is a list of activities to help students practice and reinforce their math skills. We recommend practicing math skills in a variety of ways throughout the summer!

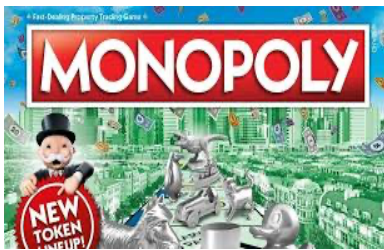


Reflex- Students should earn a green dot in Reflex Math three times each week. Practicing Reflex math helps students maintain fact fluency so they are ready for the next grade level.
